From the Headmaster

Five Year Accreditation Conferred on St. Thomas School

Congratulations and thanks to our faculty, staff, parents and students for our efforts this past year in preparation for the two day site visit of the Michigan Nonpublic School Accreditation Association team last Thursday and Friday. The team member observed classes, interviewed teachers, staff, parents and students. They also had review over 400 documents which had been prepared to justify the ratings which we had given on 73 school performance benchmarks, over 13 standards in the four domains of Mission, Governance, Academics, and Operations. We were informed that our Diocesan Director of Curriculum had not seen a school having earned so many level 4 ratings (performance ratings span from 1 to 4, a 4 representing a school exceeding the benchmark expectation.) We can all be proud of these results and our accreditation as we continue to be an example of what is possible for Catholic education in our diocese.

Partnering with Parents for the Safety of Our Children

At St. Thomas school we understand a critical role in our partnership with parents as the primary educators of their children to equip you with the tools to support your children's formation. A key aspect of this formation in our time is equipping children with the life skills of being aware of potential threats to their safety and having the tools to respond to these threads. To this end we will be sending home a letter of introduction to the newly developed Diocese of Lansing's *The kNOw Program* designed to provide adults—parents or school officials—with the materials to form children in the awareness needed to remain safe from predatory threats.

The diocese takes our responsibility to support you and our children extremely seriously and requires parents to specifically opt-in or out of participating in this program. Under normal condition the program is provided in person at school with parents attending an age appropriate version with their child(ren). This year, the diocese is offering the program materials with online access to parents. Parents are to watch an introductory video and then use the PowerPoint presentations as an instructional guide in forming their child in a matter that respects their dignity, the sensitivity of the subject, while recognizing the importance of this discussion with children. This week I will be sending you a letter of introduction with access to the Diocese resources along with an opt-in or opt-out response which will be due by **Friday, June 4**th.
