Most recently Miss Fischer comes from a teaching fellowship serving in a 4<sup>th</sup> grade classroom in a classical school in the South Bronx.

### St. Thomas Classical Curriculum Resource Review

As we continue to implement and evaluate our curricular resources used to support the instruction of our classical curriculum, we have each year looked to see where improvements may be made in the resources we use in our classical instruction. To this end, we are currently reviewing our Saxon Math text series, and our Abeka grammar series in grades 3 and 4, and our IEW grammar program in 5<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup>. Teachers are presently reviewing the <u>Dimensions Math Program</u> produced by Singapore Math for use in Kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade, and the <u>Well-Ordered Language Program</u> published by Classical Academic Press for use in 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Teachers are currently evaluating these resources. We will share their input with parents in the coming weeks in considering their possible use this fall. Both of these programs have been very successfully used to support classical education in other classical schools around the nation.

## Dress Code Policy 2021-2022

As our school grows with new students joining our community, our school culture and climate become an important focus with our dress code serving as a significant contributor to the socioemotional climate our students experience in school. With new students entering at all grades, at the start of our school year we will be placing a special emphasis on compliance with our dress code policy (attached). This gives us all an opportunity to review the dress code and ensure we are fulfilling its standards. Please pay special attention to shoes, socks, belts. Note that 5<sup>th</sup> grade is an Upper School class and will follow the Upper School Dress Code.

**Shoes**: Solid black/dark toned shoes. K – 8 girls may wear all white sneakers or flats with foot covering. PE Class Only: Tennis shoes. Boots, sandals, clogs, roller shoes, high heels, platform or shoes with logos are not dress code compliant. All shoes must have backs and toes, and be tied at all times.

**Socks**: Solid white or dark color crew socks. Solid color knee socks, leggings or tights in white, black, hunter green (lower school girls only) or navy (upper school girls only).

**General:** Belt looped pants must be worn with a brown or black belt with metal buckle only. All shirts and blouses must be tucked into pants or skirts. One pair post earrings, girls only. Polish/Make-up: None for lower school, minimal for upper school girls. No distracting haircuts, unnatural colors or styles. Jewelry: Minimal. No hats. Headmaster reserves the right to make final decisions in regard to interpreting and applying the dress code.

**Non-Compliance Procedure:** AM Homeroom Dress Code Check—A student not dress code compliant will call home from the office to have dress code wear brought to school. Students are re-admitted to the classroom only after being dress code compliant.

# Thanks to You ~ Our 2020-2021 Library Achievements

We extend our sincere appreciation to our parents and parishioners who so generously supported the development of our library collection and Catholic Student Reading Room. Special thanks to our Library Committee Members, Amanda Garred, Stephanie Kung, Natalia Fernandez, Todd Moilanen, Chris Russ, Paul Schultz, with our St. Thomas Librarian, Mrs. Sarah Davignon.

- 1. **129 books** were donated by parents and parishioners.
- 2. Also through the generosity of our school and parish community, we created a **Doctors of the Church icon wall** and added new, comfortable reading chairs and couches.
- 3. Our circulation stats have continued to climb. Since switching to our classical curriculum, we have seen a **78% increase** in the total number of circulations, from our first year to now.
- 4. We started a new club **the Junior Librarians** that helps me in the library once a month, learning about what it means to be a librarian.
- 5. 232 books which were either old, damaged, unused or whose content did not support our school mission were removed from the collection.
- 6. We hosted a **virtual book fair** and are planning to host another in-person fair next year.
- 7. **Class visits** to the library did not cease. Each week, every class had an opportunity to come to the library, hear stories or learn research skills, and check-out books.
