From the Headmaster

On The Virtue of Decorum

The true dignity of the human person—a child—is their capacity to respond *inwardly* to the *outward* experience of the good, the true and the beautiful—a capacity flowing from their being an image of the divine nature. This capacity for wonder, inspiration and joy in this encounter with the transcendent <u>is</u> our humanity.

Yet we live in a social culture where this capacity--this dignity, is being eroded in children. They are commonly exposed to banal, crass and degrading experiences and behaviors which can be filtered but not eliminated. To leave a child's vulnerable human spirit exposed to this contemporary ethos hardens their sensitivity to the transcendent and obscures the self-awareness of their own and others' dignity. Classical Catholic Education intentionally creates an environment that is indeed counter-cultural—a radical departure from prevalent norms of complacence, the mediocrity of the casual, and unformed spontaneity. The environment of a classical Catholic school is intended to be a setting where a child's human dignity is taught and celebrated. Such an environment flows from the training of children in the lived virtue of *decorum*.

Decorum, formally, is 'the behavior that is proper, befitting, or suitable for a particular setting'. Classical Catholic education takes up the question 'What behavior befits my dignity and that of this place?' or 'What norms of behavior reveal to children their full dignity as *human*?' Etiquette and manners are common forms of decorum. Training a child in grace and courtesy toward other children and adults is an important focus in education. While decorum in a school takes on positive qualities: self-possession, sincerity, manners, deference, and grace. it may also be made concrete in identifying its absence: e.g. foolishness, sarcasm, self-promotion, and disrespect.

Does a climate of decorum permit the spirit of play that is also essential to the human spirit? Play is a key quality of our humanity and of any healthy human community. The spontaneity and creativity of play are naturally interwoven in the child and are informed by a climate of decorum. Indeed, a child can experience all things as play when informed by decorum because the first and immediate result of creating an environment of decorum is *interior peace*. Where decorum resides, there is psychological and spiritual order, a communion and wholeness that allows a child to be him or herself--with their self and with others. And thereby, in play and in work, the fruits of the Spirit take hold--love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. It is indeed only in such a climate that a child discovers in themselves and through others their true identity – that they are a reflection of the divine perfection!

COVID Update:

Based on revised CDC guidelines, the Washtenaw County Department of Health has issued *new requirements* in regard to isolation of positive COVID-19 cases and quarantining of exposure individuals.

- <u>Positive COVID Case Protocols:</u>
 - Isolate at home for at least 5 days after symptom onset: Day 0 is the day symptoms started or test sample was collected.
 - On day 5, does case have no symptoms or symptoms are resolving?
 - If yes, can stop isolation on day 6. *Continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others through day 10.*
 - If no, should NOT stop isolation continue isolating until symptoms resolve or 10 days have gone by since tested positive or first developed symptoms. If case has a fever, continue to isolate until fever goes away.
 - "Resolving symptoms" means symptoms have gotten noticeably better. Some symptoms (like fatigue and loss of smell) may last a longer time
- <u>COVID Exposure Protocols:</u>
 - If exposed in a lower-risk school setting no contact tracing is required. This includes most in-school contacts, including classrooms, buses, lunch, and most extra-curricular activities. Individuals should closely monitor symptoms for 10 days.
 - If exposed in a higher-risk setting, complete contact tracing and 5 day quarantine per above.
 - Household contacts of a positive case.
 - Outbreaks: if part of outbreak class/group.
 - NOTE: High risk exposure is also eligible for the 'Test and Stay' quarantine with 10 day masking and testing based on vaccination status, previous COVID-19 illness (within last 90 days).
- Current St. Thomas Cases:
 - Upper School Faculty (1)—low risk exposure
