

Gabriel Richard High School and lift both schools up as great choices for families seeking a Catholic education for their high school students.

This effort is in line with Bishop Boyea's vision of education in the Diocese which sees each region being able to offer a Classical option for its students.

From the Headmaster

Please read below the instruction provided by Archbishop of the Diocese of Milwaukee, Jerome E. Listecki published as a concise **Catechesis on the Theology of the Body**. This week we present the second of four installments, Catechesis—Part I.

CATECHESIS

The Church teaches that the human person, created in the image and likeness of God, is a "unified creature composed of body and soul." The soul is the spiritual principle of each human person and the "subject of human consciousness and freedom." Yet man is truly himself only "when his body and soul are intimately united." The human person is not a soul or a mind that has a body merely as a biological accessory. Rather, the human person is a body formed by a soul. Human life and love are "always lived out in body and spirit," and thus the body is a "vital expression of our whole being." So integral, in fact, is the body to who we are as human beings that the body and soul together are fashioned and "destined to live forever." The creed expresses a belief in the "resurrection of the body," or the belief that all persons will "rise again with their own bodies which they now bear." The body which will one day rise is the very body which each person received as a gift and in which each person lives out his vocation to holiness.

Our biological sex, expressed by our body, is a gift from God and is unchangeable. A person's biological sex is expressed in and through the body. It cannot be changed because it is bestowed by God as a *gift* and as a *calling*, and "the gifts and the call of God are irrevocable." Biological sex is a *gift* because in the very act of creation, God bestows upon each human person a biological sex—"Male and female he created them" two sexes that are *different*, *equal*, and *complementary*. It is a *calling* because we work out our salvation via our masculinity or femininity. In other words, human persons do not experience the

freedom and joy of salvation despite their biological sex, but only in it and through it. [Citations below.]

COVID Update:

Washtenaw County Department of Health has rescinded its mask mandate for schools effective Monday, February 28th. Schools and school districts are to choose their masking protocol. St. Thomas School has been following the legal status of masking as currently established in state law, with parents having the option to have their student wear or not wear a mask. All adult staff and visitors will now have the same option to wear or not wear a mask.

Isolation/quarantine requirements for positive cases remain in place. Individuals testing positive may either quarantine for 10 days, or return on day six with improving symptoms, wearing a mask through day ten. Reporting requirements of positive cases remain in place. Regarding exposures, the amended protocols remain in place that low risk settings (all settings at St. Thomas School) do not require contact tracing or quarantine. As usual, all community members are expected to monitor health and test (either PCR or rapid antigen) when having either one high risk symptom or two low risk symptoms per below:

Positive COVID Case Protocols:

- Isolate at home for at least 5 days after symptom onset: Day 0 is the day symptoms started or test sample was collected.
- On day 5, does case have no symptoms or symptoms are resolving?
 - o If yes, can stop isolation on day 6. *Continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others through day 10.*
 - If no, should NOT stop isolation continue isolating until symptoms resolve or 10 days have gone by since tested positive or first developed symptoms. If case has a fever, continue to isolate until fever goes away.
 - "Resolving symptoms" means symptoms have gotten noticeably better.
 Some symptoms (like fatigue and loss of smell) may last a longer time

COVID Exposure Protocols:

If exposed in a lower-risk school setting no contact tracing is required. This
includes most in-school contacts, including classrooms, buses, lunch, and
most extra-curricular activities. Individuals should closely monitor symptoms
for 10 days.

- If exposed in a higher-risk setting, complete contact tracing and 5 day quarantine per above.
 - o Household contacts of a positive case.
 - Outbreaks: if part of outbreak class/group.
- NOTE: High risk exposure is also eligible for the 'Test and Stay' quarantine with 10 day masking and testing based on vaccination status, previous COVID-19 illness (within last 90 days).
