## From the Headmaster

I share this week the last part of the concise instruction written by Archbishop of Diocese of Milwaukee, Jerome E. Listecki in his **Catechesis on the Theology of the Body**. This week we present Catechesis—Part III.

#### **CATECHESIS**

**Respect for creation is also a respect for one's biological sex.** As Pope Francis writes, "It is enough to recognize that our body itself establishes us in a direct relationship with the environment and with other living beings. The acceptance of our bodies as God's gift is vital for welcoming and accepting the entire world as a gift from the Father and our common home, whereas thinking that we enjoy absolute power over our own bodies turns, often subtly, into thinking that we enjoy absolute power over creation. Learning to accept our body, to care for it, and to respect its fullest meaning, is an essential element of any genuine human ecology. Also, valuing one's own body in its femininity or masculinity is necessary if I am going to be able to recognize myself in an encounter with someone who is different. In this way we can joyfully accept the specific gifts of another man or woman, the work of God the Creator, and find mutual enrichment. It is not a healthy attitude which would seek 'to cancel out sexual difference because it no longer knows how to confront it'." <sup>25</sup> [Citations below.]



## St. Joseph Table—This Week!

St. Thomas will honor St. Joseph on March 16-18, as we approach his feast day on Saturday the 19th, with a traditional devotion called the "St. Joseph Table". The devotion began in Sicily during a terrible drought and famine, with intercession to St. Joseph bringing the famine come to an end. In thanksgiving for his miraculous help, the people set up beautiful tables in his honor which were covered with food that was blessed by the priest. ## St. Thomas School ESP Coordinator Position

St. Thomas is seeking a five day per week **Extended School Day Program Coordinator** who will supervise our ESP team of tutors, serving each day from 2:30 to 5:30 PM. The position will work closely with the school administration in scheduling tutoring, monitoring our program resources, and reviewing program effectiveness while supervising with another team member the ESP children during the afternoon ESP program hours. Relevant experience in child care and appropriate communication skills are required. Contact the school office for additional information.

### **COVID Update:**

Washtenaw County Department of Health has rescinded its mask mandate for schools effective Monday, February 28<sup>th</sup>. Schools and school districts are to choose their masking

protocol. Isolation/quarantine requirements for positive cases remain in place. Individuals testing positive may either quarantine for 10 days, or return on day six with improving symptoms, wearing a mask through day ten. Reporting requirements of positive cases remain in place. Regarding exposures, the amended protocols remain in place that low risk settings (all settings at St. Thomas School) do not require contact tracing or quarantine. As usual, all community members are expected to monitor health and test (either PCR or rapid antigen) when having either one high risk symptom or two low risk symptoms per below:

• Positive COVID Case Protocols:

•

- Isolate at home for at least 5 days after symptom onset: Day 0 is the day symptoms started or test sample was collected.
  - On day 5, does case have no symptoms or symptoms are resolving?
    - If yes, can stop isolation on day 6. *Continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others through day 10.*
    - If no, should NOT stop isolation continue isolating until symptoms resolve or 10 days have gone by since tested positive or first developed symptoms. If case has a fever, continue to isolate until fever goes away.
    - "Resolving symptoms" means symptoms have gotten noticeably better.
      Some symptoms (like fatigue and loss of smell) may last a longer time
- <u>COVID Exposure Protocols:</u>
  - If exposed in a lower-risk school setting no contact tracing is required. This includes most in-school contacts, including classrooms, buses, lunch, and most extra-curricular activities. Individuals should closely monitor symptoms for 10 days.
  - If exposed in a higher-risk setting, complete contact tracing and 5 day quarantine per above.
    - Household contacts of a positive case.
    - Outbreaks: if part of outbreak class/group.
  - NOTE: High risk exposure is also eligible for the 'Test and Stay' quarantine with 10 day masking and testing based on vaccination status, previous COVID-19 illness (within last 90 days).
