From the Headmaster

Definitions Series – Week 4

Last week, I went over the ideas of "teaching" and "education" in the classical tradition. Of course, we are not just a classical school, but a classical *Catholic* school. The Faith is not just something added to what we've been talking, but the reality at its very heart. Hence, we need to account for what it means to have a "Catholic education."

An education that is Catholic is one that is integrated by the Catholic Faith. This means that the worship, truths, and thinking of Christ's Church inform our entire approach to knowledge, study, and formation. To "inform" means to be a principle of unity and purpose. We are not offering a Catholic education simply by having a religion class, or by having Mass and prayer, or by talking about things of the Faith. These are all parts – and Mass the central one – of having a Catholic education, but, for an education to truly be *informed* by the Faith, all aspects of what we do at school must be part of a broader unity, that common mindset, love, and vision I've talked about in previous weeks. All of this is perhaps best expressed as a kind of culture, a way of life that carries with it a set of ideas, expectations, values, perspectives, etc. that, in this case, the Faith provides.

This certainly does not mean that all studies and formation at school are so many parts of teaching or handing on the Faith. Divine Revelation and the workings of grace do not obliterate nature, nor should the natural level and human reason be collapsed into the supernatural level. These two levels remain distinct while also remaining in unity. Hence, we speak of faith and reason, not as separated ways of knowing, but as, in the image of Pope John Paul II, two wings by which we rise to the contemplation of Truth.

Indeed, the Catholic Faith in its very nature leaves room for the operations of reason and human freedom. What it brings to these is a higher light, an eternal perspective and a proper ordering of values and ideas. What is utilitarian, efficient, measurable, productive, etc. is, in this higher light, subordinated to what is beautiful, sacrificial, and formative of the heart and mind. And this ordering is well-supported by the liberal arts approach, which, as we have already noted, pursues truth and the formation of the mind as goods in themselves, and not for some further product or end.

That is why, in classical Catholic education, we always speak of the "true, the good, the beautiful." These are some of the "transcendentals," qualities that every being has simply by existing. Every being is intelligible (true), desirable and valuable (good), and manifests itself as a whole (beautiful). Every being exists by participating in Being Itself, God, Who is Truth, Goodness, and Beauty Itself. When the mind is led to the transcendentals, it is directed to God. Putting transcendent reality first and foremost is a training in wisdom.

Next week, we will close out our series by looking at what we mean by the interrelated terms "Western Tradition," "Catholic culture," and "Western Civilization."
