From the Headmaster

You may have noticed that I was out three days last week. I was attending a principals' retreat and conference run by the Institute of Catholic Liberal Education (ICLE), with whom the diocese is partnering to shift all diocesan schools to a liberal arts approach. It was a packed and fruitful time for me and all the principals as we were introduced to the grounding philosophy and methods of the Catholic liberal arts tradition. I enjoyed a number of good conversations and ideas and questions to ponder.

As a classical school over 5 years "ahead" of most other diocesan schools in this shift, we have already been pursuing key aspects of this new (and ancient) diocesan approach, which include the following:

- Emphasis on pursuing what it true, good, and beautiful for its own sake, rather than in a utilitarian way, such as scoring highly on a test, being prepared to get a good job, etc.
- De-emphasis on testing, data, and measurement, subordinating these to the wholistic, integrated pursuit of wisdom.
- Emphasis on doing a few things well rather than many things in a checklist, cursory fashion.
- Emphasis on "returning to the basics" of listening, memorizing, reading, writing, and discussing.

One of my big takeaways was how much joy and beauty can be had in simplicity. Anyone familiar with educational trends of the last 30+ years can attest to its tendency to "faddism" and increasing busy-ness. While good teaching certainly requires careful planning and crafting, as well as an openness to new approaches, we tend to over-complicate things when we participate in this exhausting, fruitless chase after the latest and greatest in pedagogy. I believe that one motivator in this chase is the desire for control: we want to assure ourselves that our methods are yielding desired, immediate, and tangible "outcomes." One immediate problem with this desire is that is too often leaves little room for the working of the Holy Spirit and the natural "play" of the mind that is needed for it to grow in a natural and fruitful way. As a school, if we ever forget who the primary Teacher is, we have most certainly lost our way, reduced to the state of the "blind leading the blind."

Today at assembly I told the students about our saint for the term, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690), whose feast day is on October 16th. She was responsible for spreading the devotion to the Sacred Heart and the creation of the Feast of the Sacred Heart on the octave day of Corpus Christi. She also encouraged First Friday devotions to the Sacred Heart in reparation for sins and outrages against It, such that it is customary for votive Masses to the Sacred Heart to be offered on First Fridays. Hence, our EF Mass on October 6th will be a votive Mass to the Sacred Heart.

Building Security Assessment

In our on-going commitment to implementing meaningful and effective safety protocols, I have invited Sergeant Eugene Rush from the Washtenaw County Sherrif's Office back this Thursday to run a security assessment for our building and campus. This will build on the Active Shooter Training we had in August and allow us to continue to reflect on various ways we can keep our children safe. I will be sharing general take-aways from his evaluation via newsletter, as well as hosting a parent meeting for a more detailed summary of his insights. Stay tuned for more information next week.
