From the Headmaster

It was great seeing and talking with many of you at parent-teacher conferences last Friday. Thank you again for you great love and commitment to your children; we are honored to be able to partner with you in their education! I can vouch for all of my teachers in saying that they truly care for your children and have great insights to share about them!

This week is a full one. Angel House Award Day for Raphael House members is tomorrow. They will be able to dress down, and will be receiving a treat at lunch and an extra play time in the gym. On Wednesday, dress-up day, Turkey Trot forms are due. On Thursday, we have our wine, cheese, and poetry night, and Friday is Turkey Trot day!

This Friday will also be a bonus, special dress-down day. Students should wear their Turkey Trot shirts. This time only, they may wear appropriately fitting warm-up pants or sweatpants, but no shorts, spandex, or leggings. Don't forget to submit the \$7 donation and pledge form by this Wednesday.

The winning recitations of "In Flanders Fields" were wonderfully delivered at assembly this morning by our 5th-8th grade girls. The grand-prize winners for both boys and girls will be announced at next week's assembly.

This poem provided a good opportunity to remind the students about Veterans' Day and why it occurs on November 11^{th} . I asked students to listen for the flower mentioned in the poem – the poppy – which was often seen growing on top of the recently-made graves along the Western Front during World War I.

This is generally a month for remembrance and for thinking about the "Four Last Things" – death, judgment, heaven, and hell. I talked about why these are "last things" and how these help us as Christians to focus on what is most important every day. All of these things are very real and final; the stakes are high! We called to mind the 2 ways spoken about by Christ in the Gospel of Matthew – the one wide and well-traveled, the other narrow and not often traveled. Every day is a gift, an occasion for new graces and time to make up for our past sins. The time we have is so very precious, and we should never waste it. Every day, our most important consideration is, "How can I grow closer to Christ today?" All of us, ultimately, will travel one of those two ways, and we shouldn't kid ourselves into thinking that our ultimate destination is already determined. So we must "work out our salvation," cooperating with the new graces that Christ has for us every day.

Introducing Our New Choral Music Teacher

I am pleased to announce the hire of Miss Emily De Long, who will be our long-term substitute for the remainder of the school year for K-10 music. Emily attended Hillsdale College, pursuing pre-med and history. She is currently taking a sabbatical before she completes her degree. Going back to her time in high school, she has had a number of years' experience singing with professional and college choirs, including the National Catholic Youth Choir, the Cathedral Choir of Phoenix. and the Hillsdale College Choir. Miss De Long has a deep love and appreciation for sacred music and classical education. She was able to observe Mrs. Setterholm's classes and is very excited to be part of our school and its mission. Rosary Group for the School

Please join your St Thomas the Apostle School community in praying for our teachers, staff, and students while school is in session. Padre Pio said that the rosary is the weapon for these times, so let us use it for the guidance, growth and protection of our beloved school!

Our mission is to start a Living Rosary during the school year on each day of the week for this intention. The Living Rosary is basically the idea that a group commits to saying a full rosary together by splitting up the decades. See the attached document for more information on how the Living Rosary got started, but Pope Saint John Paul II started a group in his parish during the Nazi invasion and continued to promote these groups in parishes throughout his lifetime.

We ask that each parent sign up to commit to saying one decade of the rosary each weekday. A decade consists of one Our Father, ten Hail Mary's, one Glory Be and the Fatima prayer if desired (O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of Hell, lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of Thy mercy.). Opening prayers (Apostles Creed, Our Father, Three Hail Mary's and Glory Be) are only said before the First Joyful Mystery. Closing Prayer (Hail Holy Queen) is only said after the Last Glorious Mystery.

Please <u>sign up here</u> for a decade and we will send out daily reminders starting Monday November 13th. There can definitely be more than one parent per mystery; the more rosaries the better!
