### From the Headmaster

Now into the second week of Advent, we focused today at assembly on a "third coming" that, in a sense, falls "between" the first and second comings of Christ: His coming into our hearts. We talked about what it means to say that Jesus "comes into our hearts," especially since this phrase is often used but not always well understood. This required us to explore what a "spirit" is and how we can ascertain its reality, since a spirit cannot be seen or touched with the physical senses. I had the students all pause to think about something, and then I noted how, though our thoughts could not be seen or touched, they were nonetheless quite real.

A spirit is present wherever it acts; God, Who is pure spirit, is present in all things insofar as He is acting throughout His creation and upholding all things in existence. But there is a special, more intimate way by which He can be in us. Through His grace, He invites us to open our hearts to the working of His Holy Spirit, which leads to a union of love. This presence in us can only happen with our cooperation, however; it is something that comes about in accord with our nature as human *persons* with free will and understanding.

I asked students this week to especially focus on their reception of Holy Communion at Mass, encouraging them always to approach the Sacrament with devotion and intention. Indeed, whenever we receive Him, we either progress or regress in the spiritual life; either our hearts are hardened because we approach thoughtlessly and carelessly, or they are drawn closer to Christ through our cooperation with His sacramental grace. There is no obligation to receive Holy Communion at a given Mass, and we need to discern whether we are in a state of grace and approaching with the right mindset and intentions. Nonetheless, we should strive to receive Him frequently and pray for an increased love and desire for the Eucharist. There is no surer or more universal way of growing in holiness than cultivating this desire and love and enjoying the fruits of the union we experience in this holiest of sacraments.
