From the Headmaster

I am writing today from the hospital. My wife Emma delivered a healthy and beautiful baby girl, Genevieve Therese, at 12:30 a.m. last night and is now trying to rest! Thank you for your prayers.

Special thanks and recognition to Coach Bob and parent volunteers for raising us to this level in only our second year! The state competition will be held on Saturday, December 16th.

I look forward to our Art, Poetry, and Music Night next Tuesday evening. Please note that this evening is *required* for students as an extension of their classwork. Mr Miller was able to arrange moving the basketball game that night, so I expect to see everyone there for a series of great performances. As a school event, students are still required to follow the instructions of their teachers and behave according to school rules. As in years past, students should dress up for the event.

Parents of 4th-10th graders, as we pass through the middle of the Nicholas Term, please be sure to check student grades on FACTS. Teachers will be working hard to keep you updated. We don't want any surprises when we come back from Christmas break!

As a reminder, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception is a Holy Day of Obligation. The school community's participation in the liturgical life of the Church is not a "side-show" to our main focus, but very much at the heart of what we are about. I take seriously the Church's law surrounding Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, and that is why I make a point of avoiding, as much as possible, requiring my faculty and staff to work on these days. So the point of our day off really is for the families to focus on this great feast together, and the central part of that, of course, is hearing Mass together!

Next week, we will be commemorating Our Lady of Guadalupe twice. On the actual feast day, December 12th, our schola will sing some of the propers and another piece to promote the solemnity of that day. The following day, the 13th, will see our annual performance of Our Lady's appearance to Juan Diego, put on by our lower school under the direction of Mrs. Lashaway directly before the school Mass.

From the Dean

The upper schoolers continue to press on with Iconography. They have been experiencing the quiet, inner strength that this ancient practice calls out of one who commits to it. We surround the practice of writing icons of St. Gabriel the Archangel with much silence so that that quiet, inner strength - so necessary to discover as a young person - can develop, like a furnace gathering heat. It is this interior strength that grants the ability to truly *achieve* something. And this is what these young guys are made for: to grow in their ability to achieve, and to achieve the breaking-in of the sacramental presence of God into the world. Iconography has been challenging this year, but the upper schoolers are beginning to experience the fruits and growth of those challenges.

In addition, we began a new Immersive Mission in November: Garment-Making. The goal of this mission is for each student to produce a confessional stole for one of the seminarians who are being ordained to the priesthood in June for the Archdiocese of Detroit. On November 8th we travelled out to Sacred Heart Seminary to meet these gentlemen, with each of our students interviewing them and getting to know them a bit. Now we are engaging with the task of actually making the stoles. The purpose of this is not simply for the guys to learn how to sew (to give them a "life skill", as it were). The purpose of this mission is to give these guys a way to give of themselves to bless another person; to give them a mission and a way of love within the Church. These things are so essential for young people to encounter. Moreover, there also has been a great deal of camaraderie amongst the guys as they set of trying to do this together.

The upper schoolers also continue to journey along the way of prayer. Over the past month the theme has been "The Call". We have meditated, in many ways, on passages that help us hear and face the call of God: to live for Him, to choose Him, to put to death the reign of sin in us, to embrace the way of prayer more wholeheartedly, etc. We have drawn meditations from St. Benedict, St. Ignatius, St. Anthony of the Desert, St. Teresa of Avila, and St. Honoratus. Now we are turning towards more explicitly meditating upon the life of Jesus, seeking that precious gift of "an intimate knowledge of our Lord, who has become man for me, that I may love Him more and follow Him more closely" (St. Ignatius). We have also been introducing Ignatius's Discernment of Spirits, which is an essential tool in the spiritual life.

As the Dean, I have also been regularly meeting one-on-one with each upper schooler (and some middle schoolers) to help them grow spiritually, to help them understand themselves better, to mentor them, and to help them in whatever difficulties they might be facing; to challenge and encourage them. I do all of this in collaboration and communication with their parents so that each kid can receive the shepherding they need.

Other things that I have been helping out with: recruiting new students for the upper school, playing music with the upper schoolers, helping with both the guys and girls middle school households, teaching a Scripture class for the 10th graders, running the physical training aspect of the upper school, taking the upper schoolers on a silent missionary walk into Ann Arbor, and spending dedicated time in the chapel praying for the school and all of its students.
