From the Headmaster

We are now in the thick of Lent, and it feels also as if we are already into spring! Plenty of things are coming our way in March, but, as I reminded the students at assembly today, Lent is also a time to simplify, to focus in on what's most important. Yesterday at Mass, we heard the story of the Transfiguration, which serves as a reminder of where we are headed as the goal of the battle we are currently fighting against the world, the flesh, and the devil. The glimpse that Jesus gave his 3 apostles – the same 3 who joined him during the agony in the garden – was a source of encouragement and a bolster for their faith, which was to be severely tested during His passion and death. I encouraged the students to pray for a stronger faith this Lent. It is a virtue that helps us to cling to Jesus and His Truth through all trials and suffering.

In introducing March Is Reading Month, I emphasized with the students that this is not about the quantity of books read, but the quality of reading and the time invested. This year, we have changed the focus and structure of the reading competitions (which begin next week) to better reflect what we are trying to do in reading at a classical school. One change is that we will be competing as houses rather than as individual classes. Teachers will be determining how they will be "measuring" reading for their own class and will be sending out details about that this week. As a faculty, we take seriously the idea that what we read forms us – our intellect, imagination, desires, emotions –, habituating us to certain ways of thinking

and feeling. There is no better time to form reading habits than when we are young and still wide open to receiving what is new!

As a note, due to the special dress days during March, we will not have our regularly scheduled dress-up and dress-down days. Teachers will be clarifying with students on good/bad dress ideas for those special days.

March Is Reading Month

Here are the plans for our upcoming month of reading:

Household Reading Competitions: March 4th-22nd

- Angel House Competition: Each house will compete to earn the most points from reading. Each lower-school (K-5) teacher will be, based on their own points system, be determining on a weekly basis which house within their respective class is 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. A first-place finishing house from a given class will earn 5 points for their house, with 2nd place earning 3 points and 3rd place earning 1 point. These points will be tallied across classes at the end of each week and added to the grand total as we progress through March. The house with the most points on March 22nd will win the prize, which is being finalized with Mrs. Deemer.
- Middle-School Household Competition: Using a list of good books compiled by their teachers, each household will try to read as many books as possible. The competition will not require logging minutes, pages read, or anything else besides simply the titles of the books read. The prizes are a trip to PizzaPazza in Kerrytown for the winning household, and a separate prize of a nice edition of a book picked by the teachers for the top 4 readers in the middle school.
- Upper School: For the pure joy of reading and the challenge of it, the 9th and 10th graders will be working their way through *War and Peace* with Mr.
 Massett, perhaps while sipping tea!

Winners of the reading competitions will also be announced.

Canned Food Drive Supporting Hope Clinic

Mr. Votel is coordinating, with his 6th-grade class, a Lenten food drive for Hope Clinic. This drive, which has already begun, will run through the week before Holy Week. Please see the attached guidelines from Hope Clinic for donations. The 6th graders will be tracking the number of items each class brings in, and the class that brings in the most average items per student will receive a prize, to be determined!

Please note that, first and foremost, this is about helping the poor, not winning a competition. Certainly, any food items that fit the criteria of the attached guidelines are welcome, but a hundred cans of tomato paste (as an example) would perhaps not be the best contribution. Also, please do not open packages of bulk items (whether food or non-food such as hygiene or paper products), since the clinic can't distribute items that have been taken out of the package with the proper labels. For that reason, smaller-sized items are usually better. Cereal, rice, peanut butter, oatmeal, and cooking oil are all good/needed items.

Please also note that, though the guidelines include various dairy and meat items as possible donations, we will not be able to accept anything that requires refrigeration. Thus, for food donations, please stick to non-perishable items.
