Congratulations, JV Girls Basketball!






Special Dress Day: Characters in History

I took a tour myself and was impressed by their knowledge! Meanwhile, our kindergartners dressed up as characters in ancient history. Mr. Pietryga graciously gave us labels!







From the Headmaster

Today at assembly, Mr. Pietryga updated the angel house reading competition. Last week, Raphael earned 20 points, Michael 18, and Gabriel 16. The students in all grades have been coming up with creative outfits for our special dress days. It's been great fun seeing famous figures from across eras of western history grace the halls of our school!

I also explored with the students the meaning and significance of the word "heritage." Closely tied to the dynamic of "tradition," a "handing on," a heritage is a kind of inheritance, an entrustment. This is something that we as a school are trying to do. Indeed, each teacher seeks to hand on to his or her students what he or she has received. As human beings, we are in many ways receivers, including of our very identity as an individual person. I pointed out that our very name is simply given to us. When teachers are guiding students to read good literature or history, they are seeking to pass on the ideas, images, and loves of a cultural inheritance, something through which students can develop a meaningful identity. Even as we are seeking to entrust the young with this inheritance, so they, as receivers, must trust who is

handing this on and *that* what they are being handed is truly good and beautiful. As they get older, they will also need to reflect on this heritage, wrestle with and question it, and, ultimately, come to know and love it even more deeply than their teachers.

Our discussion evening on technology last week was very lightly attended. The parents that joined Mike Hanley, Mr. McCoy, and I were able to share their concerns and thoughts, which centered on issues of family culture, the formation of the young, and continued practical guidance on managing screen access at home. As we get nearer to the summer, I'd like to offer a kind of challenge for families over the summer, with an eye to offering support in thinking of alternative ways to spend our free time. I sincerely believe that screen use for our students is a question of great importance in their formation, and, given the predominant cultural assumptions and approaches to this issue, it will take, *collectively*, a *concerted* and *intentional* effort on the part of the school and parents to develop a healthy relationship with various forms of screens and online media.

Our teachers and I had another great session with our sister schools and ICLE last Wednesday. One of the presenters was a former teacher, Marie Kelly! The session focused on the importance of inquiry in the classroom, especially through seminar and question-and-answer instruction. I anticipate further conversations among our teachers as we reflect on the insights offered by ICLE.
