From the Headmaster

This week, on October 16th, is Margaret Mary Alacoque's feast day. Our first term is named after this great saint who helped begin the devotion to the Sacred Heart. I asked students, building on a quotation that Mr. Pietryga had shared from St. Catherine of Siena, to ask for St. Margaret Mary's intercession this week, that their hearts, as hers was, might become transformed into Christ's, allowing them to combat self-love and grow in the supernatural virtue of charity – loving God above all else and loving our neighbor with the love of God.

This week also I look forward to having our kindergartners and first graders sing a short piece as a communion meditation for our all-school Mass this Thursday. Our choral music teachers – Miss De Long (Boys' Schola), Miss Skrobola (2nd-5th and

Girls' Schola), and Mr. Oram (K-1st and 6th-8th) have been working with their respective students not only to teach them the basics of music and singing, but also to prepare them to be able to sing the Mass and sing at Mass. We hope to have further opportunities for various student levels to sing at Mass this school year.

Just a reminder that the end of our first term is this Friday. As a note, this year, the term endings have been shifted so as to end Nicholas term before Christmas break. Though this makes the first and second terms a little shorter, it allows for everything, including exams, to be wrapped up in December. Please check on FACTS for current grades. If they haven't already, invites to sign up for parent-teacher conferences (Oct. 31) should be going out soon.

Our next two weeks will be three-day weeks! Next week, our full-time teachers will be joining their counterparts from St. Mary's in Williamston (the other "classical" parish school in the diocese) and Resurrection in Lansing for a two-day workshop with the Institute of Catholic Liberal Education (ICLE) on mimetic instruction. I look forward to another enriching time with our fellow teachers and ICLE!

All Saints' Celebration

The school will celebrate All Saints' Day on October 30th. Students are encouraged to come to school dressed as a saint. Those not wishing to dress up may come in their school uniform. After Mass, we will pray a litany of saints as a school in the church. We will then make our way to the parish hall to allow the K-4 students to show off their costumes. In the days leading up, 5th-11th graders will be participating in a class competition to deliver the best encomium, a short speech offered in praise – in this case – of the saint they are dressed as. The winner from each class will receive a prize and deliver the short speech to the school that morning. During the course of the day, classes will be having their own celebrations as well.

Poetry Discussion Night (Oct. 29)

Miss Benz and Miss Schoenle, our upper- and middle-school literature teachers, will be leading a reading and discussion of George Herbert's "Mattens" and "Evensong" the evening of Tuesday, October 29th, from 6:30-8:00 p.m. in the school library. No prior reading or preparation is necessary, though both poems can be readily found online. Come enjoy wine, light refreshments and the beauty of poetry!

November 8th Extraordinary Form School Requiem Mass

Our next EF school Mass will be on November 8th, which falls within the octave of All Saints, a perfect time to offer a Requiem Mass for the faithful departed. This will be a great opportunity for students to focus on a major liturgical theme for the month of November and participate in a spiritual work of mercy.
