From the Headmaster

At assembly today, I reminded the students about the season of Lent, starting next Wednesday. This is a perfect time to reorient our life and seek deeper conversion. As I told the students, our Lenten efforts are rooted in prayer. I encouraged them to make time for personal prayer as a lead-up to Lent, asking God to help them know what He is calling them to do to draw closer to Him.

"Making time for prayer" – that will be our school's "theme" for this Lent. It's something I am asking each family to do in a way that makes sense for its context. As a school community, it is critical that we constantly call ourselves back to what is fundamentally important – prayer, the work of grace, the love and worship of God. All the many good things we can pursue and the events and activities we can organize and participate in are all well and good, but, in the midst of our activity, are we too busy for God? I know that, for me personally, if I am not dedicating time to pray, my entire perspective on life becomes skewed and unbalanced. Prayer is in fact a central means by which our entire school's life can be rightly ordered in service to Our Lord.

Believe it or not, Scholastica Term is ending in a few weeks! On March 21st, we will have an early dismissal to allow for teachers and parents to meet for (optional) parent-teacher conferences between 1 and 5 p.m. We will relay instructions in the next week or two on setting up a conference.

March Reading Month

Household Reading Competitions: March 3rd-28th

- Angel House Competition: Each house will compete to earn the most points from reading. Each K-4 classroom teacher will be, based on their own points system, be determining on a weekly basis which house within their respective class is 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. A first-place finishing house from a given class will earn 5 points for their house, with 2nd place earning 3 points and 3rd place earning 1 point. These points will be tallied across classes at the end of each week and added to the grand total as we progress through March. The house with the most points on March 28th will win a prize, TBD.
- The 5th graders will hold a competition among their own households. Details will be sent out later this week by Miss Cullen to the 5th-grade parents. Prize TBD.

- The middle-school competition will be among the four households. Mrs. Votel will be giving the students an approved list, which will specify a point value for each book based on length and difficulty. When a student finishes a book on the list, he should bring the physical copy of the book he read to Mrs. Votel, whereupon they will have a chat about it! If the student demonstrates that they read the book, they will earn points for their household. Households may also receive bonus points for full group participation in themed dress days! Mrs. Votel will keep the tally herself and periodically announce the rankings. The winning household will receive a field trip to Pizza Pazza in Kerrytown for a pizza party!
- For the upper school, Miss Benz is still finalizing details for their special reading endeavor in March. More details to come!

Special Events in March

 - The Feast of St. Joseph- Normal dress code, only the students can wear something red- a shirt, tie, vest, sweater, socks, hairbow, pin, etc. Mrs. Deemer will set up a St. Joseph Table in the school office hallway, and the students can come by before their lunch period to visit the table and receive a St. Joseph cream puff and/or bread.

- GRAND FINALE: MON, MARCH 31
 - During morning assembly, we will have our second annual game of Literary Trivia. Two representatives from each of grades 1st-11th will be selected to compete in trivia competitions (broken up by grade

bands) with questions composed by their teachers about literary subjects. Winners of the reading competitions will also be announced.

Diaper/Food Drive Supporting Guadalupe Workers

Mr. Votel is coordinating, with his 6^{th} -grade class, a Lenten diaper/food drive for Guadalupe Workers, an organization dedicated to supporting mothers with unplanned pregnancies who need help. This drive will begin on March 3^{rd} and finish on April 4^{th} . Each K-11 class will be competing to earn the most average points per student.

In view of their mission, the Guadalupe Workers are always especially in need of diapers and wipes. Generally, the following points will be awarded (subject to Mr. Votel's discretionary judgment):

- 5 points for a pack of diapers
- 1 point for a single pack of wipes
- 1 point for each food item

Food items should be non-perishable, healthy foods that can readily contribute to providing a needy expecting mother with a meal. Good items include rice, beans, pasta and pasta sauce, cereal, canned soup, canned tuna, cooking oils, and peanut butter.

One new element for this year's drive is that we would like students to "earn" the items they bring in to donate so as to make their participation a little more meaningful than merely asking mom to go to the store. Each classroom teacher will sending home a parent sign-off form for parents to fill out and return with each set of items donated. This form will verify that the student performed some chore or service at home to "earn" the set of items being brought to school at a given time. What chore or service is to be done is entirely at the parents' discretion. If a student brings in items without a corresponding signature, we will of course still accept the donation, but it will not count towards the class total for the competition.

Teachers will track and report items brought in, verifying which items "count" (with a parent signature) towards the class total. The 6^{th} graders will be collecting, 1-2 times per week, items from the classrooms. They will also arrange the delivery of items to Guadalupe Workers. Mr. Votel will oversee the whole operation and verify numbers using the teacher reports.

Please note that, first and foremost, this is about helping those in need, not winning a competition. Certainly, any food items that fit the criteria of the above guidelines

are welcome, but a hundred cans of tomato paste (as an example) would perhaps not be the best contribution. Also, please do not open packages of bulk items.

JV Girls' Basketball Update

The JV girls' basketball team began the week with a nail-biting win over the reigning champion from last year, Washtenaw Christian! The game came down to the last minute with both teams tied at 19. Two free throws from Mia Arambula-Chavez put the Lady Irish up by two, and then shutdown defense for the last twenty seconds brought the win! The girls followed that up with another win versus SSA Ann Arbor on Thursday. The team is undefeated and looks to keep it that way versus Huron Valley, SSA Plymouth, and AACS this week. GO IRISH!

Diocesan Safe Environment Resource

The Diocese of Lansing uses "The kNOw Program" to equip children, parents, and parishes with the tools to "kNOw" how to identify, thwart, and report harmful behavior. It asks its parishes and schools to offer this to parents as a resource.

According to Bishop Boyea, "This program relies on the fundamental truth that each child is created and loved by God and deserves to be safe. As adults, we must protect all of our children."

Using methods developed by the revered children's educator Fred Rogers and endorsed by physicians at the University of Michigan, "The kNOw Program" delivers lessons about safety, respect, and empowerment in an accessible and trustworthy way to both children and adults.

Unlike other safe-environment programs, this one involves the key adults in children's lives. Training sessions based on grade level (K-2, 3-5, 6-8 [male], and 6-8 [female]) are available for parents and children to view together at

Dale Ahlquist Talk, March 20th

Dale Ahlquist, celebrated author and speaker and, in Joseph Pearce's estimation, "the greatest living authority" on G.K. Chesterton's life and work, will be giving a talk at 7 p.m. in the school gym on Thursday, March 20th. Mr. Ahlquist co-founded the first Chesterton Academy, a classical high school in Minnesota, which is the flagship school of the Chesterton Schools Network. He will be speaking on "How to Create Complete Thinkers" at 7 p.m., followed by Q & A. Admission is free. Light refreshments will be provided. Attendees are welcome beginning at 6:30 to explore a selection of Mr. Ahlquist's books for sale. This will be another great opportunity for our parish community to deepen its knowledge of classical education.
