From the Headmaster

The weather is getting warmer, so it felt like the right time to read the first chapter of *The Wind in the Willows* with the students at assembly today. Mole abandons his spring cleaning for a life of "messing about in boats" on the river with Rat. Lent and early springtime go together. It was traditionally a time to go on pilgrimage, which is a perfect image for our progress through Lent.

Next week we honor St. Patrick on March 17th, but the bigger feast is next Wednesday for the Solemnity of St. Joseph. This is his month, so *ite ad Joseph*—go to Joseph! He is the patron of the Church and a powerful intercessor. For that feast, we will have a school extraordinary form Mass to which a number of our choir groups will contribute.

Drama Performances

This year, we have two performances to look forward to. On Friday, April 4th, our upper schoolers, directed by Mr. McCoy, will be performing *The Wedding Trumps the Funeral*, a one-act/one-scene play I put together. Set in 1950s Cleveland, it looks at an Irish family working through the tension between keeping the Catholic Faith and navigating the modern world. And yes, both an upcoming marriage and a dead person are involved. The upper schoolers will be performing at the Kerrytown Concert House, which is a short walk away from the school. We will be inviting middle schoolers and any parents for the 2 p.m. showing, which will be free. The 7 p.m. showing will be ticketed.

The after-school drama club, led by Mrs. Votel, will be performing *Two Orphans of Boston* at the Arthur Miller Theatre, the same venue as last year, on Friday, May 16th. We are planning on running that day according to the same general plan as last year, with an early dismissal to allow for students to gather at the theater to watch the free matinee at 2 p.m. The ticketed evening performance will follow at 7 p.m.

Dale Ahlquist Talk, March 20th

Dale Ahlquist, celebrated author and speaker and, in Joseph Pearce's estimation, "the greatest living authority" on G.K. Chesterton's life and work, will be giving a talk at 7 p.m. in the school gym on Thursday, March 20th. Mr. Ahlquist co-founded the first Chesterton Academy, a classical high school in Minnesota, which is the flagship school of the Chesterton Schools Network. He will be speaking on "How to Create Complete Thinkers" at 7 p.m., followed by Q & A. Admission is free. Light refreshments will be provided. Attendees are welcome beginning at 6:30 to explore a selection of Mr. Ahlquist's books for sale. This will be another great opportunity for our parish community to deepen its knowledge of classical education.
